Visualise Report

Published by Runnymede Trust and Freelands Foundation

Many UBAE and ARAEA members, including Kevin Dalton-Johnson and Rayvenn D'Clark, worked on the Visualise report. Marlene Wylie, then president of NSEAD was Visualise project lead. It was launched 5 March 2024 in Portcullis House.

The aim of the Visualise: To ensure art education is accessible and fulfilling for all students, and that teachers are supported to deliver a broad and engaging curriculum.

The Oak Curriculum's Anti-Racist Rubric

The Oak Curriculum will be one of NSEAD's most public and impactful projects which has equity, diversity and inclusion, at its heart, and is a direct response to the recommendations made in the Visualise: Race and Inclusion in Secondary School Art Education Report. The ARAEA curriculum checklists were the foundations stones of this work. ARAEA group member Clare Stanhope is working on the project as one of our Secondary Subject Reviewers and designed an NSEAD anti-racist rubric for all lesson creators and illustrators working on the primary and secondary curriculum.

The full Oak Curriculum will launch in October this year and is set to reach thousands of teacher, learners and schools, with over 500 fully resourced lessons

Visualise and NSEAD:

The report has become front, left and centre of our Oak and NSEAD's Curriculum Review response, and... everything.

Michele Gregson says: 'This 119page report is a game changer - for art and design, yes, and for all subjects as the report makes clear. The need for a contemporary, diverse and inclusive curricula could not be more pressing, and the evidence laid bear in this report explains why.'

One year on: Runnymede have recently published One year on data that shows: 'There has been significant and encouraging progress in terms of exam board effort to introduce greater diversity into their exam paper stimuli.' Runnymede note that whilst the findings are encouraging, it is now essential for the government to develop a more inclusive curriculum. The NSEAD Manifesto 2024 and Curriculum Review response 2025

The NSEAD Manifesto for Art, Craft and Design Education was published in April 2024. Equity and inclusion for all is at its core. Our manifesto, together with findings from the Visualise report, have driven our Curriculum and Assessment Review (CAR) response and work. Andy Ash, president of NSEAD said: 'Art, craft and design is a vital part of education, and our society. We need an inclusive curriculum that is fit for the future, and the world we live in today.' The Panchayat Collection, Research and Resource

The Panchayat Archive began with a collective of artists and practitioners, and founded in London in 1988 by Shaheen Merali and Al-An deSouza in consultation with Bhajan Hunjan, Symrath Patti and Shanti Thomas. The collection, now housed in TateBritain, includes posters, magazines, flyers. It is a record of histories, stories, activities and activism that took place between the 1980s and 2003 – all created by Asian and Black artists. The collection documents a commitment to the intersection between race, class, gender, sexuality, and disability.

Tate regards the development of the Panchayat Collection as not simply a collection of objects and ephemera but as Meera Chauda, UBAE member and artist project lead who worked on the original archive, says: 'It is the result of relationships, conversations, memories, people, and connections. It is grassroots, without institutional support, and born out of a specific need.'

Last year, Leanne Turvey and Alice Walton, Senior Learning Curators for Tate Schools and Teachers, Tate Modern and Tate Britain contacted ARAEA and UBAE. The team asked: How can the Panchayat Collection be shared with more teachers and schools. Responding to this question, a series of discussions and meetings took place and the work began.

Panchayat: 25 October 2024

Meera Chauda, Marlene Wylie, Leanne Turvey, Alice Walton and Sophie Leach initially met online. Subsequently, Meera continued planning meetings with Leanne and Alice, and a series of face-to-face meetings were arranged. The first was led by Meera, and supported by Leanne, with Husna Memon, Schools & Teachers and Young People's Programme administrator; Emily Gopaul, Marlene and Sophie met in Tate Britain. Gustavo Grandal Montero, Tate Library Collections and Engagement Manager, opened up the collection.

Meera described how in the late 90s she had helped to organise the archive. During the meeting Meera led the group with a series of questions. These included:

- How do we care and practice responsibility/pay attention to these archives?
- How do we share these archives with schools and teachers?

'On two Fridays in March this year, UBAE members gathered to explore the Panchayat Collection and to build professional relationships. The days were hosted by Leanne Turvey and Alice Walton, and co-curated by Meera Chauda and Marlene Wylie. Meera, led both days, and supported everyone present to bring all parts of themselves into the room as a safe space.

'Rich discussions and conversations flowed. Meera shared her practice and personal connection to the archive as a lens through which she could open the archive to UBAE members through discussions with Gustavo.
